Program Overview

The Environmental Stewardship Program is a landbased program at Cowichan Secondary School, located in the Cowichan Valley School District.



The program is available to grade 11 and 12 students, in which they take English 11 or 12, Environmental Science 11 or 12, Physical Geography 12, Outdoor Education 11 or 12, and Career Life Connections. These five courses are taken in a cohort with other students and instructed under the same co-teachers. This is either half-day all year in a semester system (either all morning or all afternoon), or full day for Q1 and Q4 in a quarter system.

These courses are woven together through a lens of historical to modern-day practices and perspectives, connecting and learning about the culture and knowledge of our local area. The program involves interacting with local places and people in the community while also contributing to the Environmental Stewardship of the Cowichan Valley.

Students have multiple opportunities to choose their studies and demonstrations of learning. In this way, the program embraces inquiry and encourages a growth mindset.

The main themes we will be exploring this year are: The Interrelationship of Salmon and People and Gardening the Land and the Sea.

What to expect in Environmental Stewardship?

> A supportive classroom learning community where:

- > Indigenous pedagogy is valued and included
- Positive social connections are established with teachers and peers
- > Learning is intergenerational
- > Student strengths are honoured and recognized.
- Authentic learning opportunities in local community
 - Learning with and from community organizations and experts in the field
- Projects that make a difference in the lives of others
 - A choice in what the learning focuses on and how to share what is learned
- > Outdoor experiences that:
 - Directly influence the local landscape
 - > Involve hiking in local forests
 - Build connections and understanding of local natural resources



- An expectation for academic work to reflect the interconnectedness of subject areas
 - > A deepened understanding of environmental issues

- Learn from the Salmon Enhancement Program on the Cowichan River
- Explore perspectives through current issues pertaining to environmental stewardship
- Work with guidance from a local Cowichan Elder, including visits to Somena Longhouse

What we do in Environmental Stewardship:

- Research and share our learning collaboratively
- Develop an understanding of local plants and animals in the Cowichan Valley, including endangered and at-risk species
- Explore a variety of texts for both academic and personal enjoyment
- Use engaging games and simulations to develop relationships and build academic competencies


